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INVITATION TO HOT SPRINGS FOR JUNE 2010 REGION 13 CONFERENCE

On behalf of the Hot Springs Daylily Society, we extend an invitation to you to attend the 2010 Region 13 Conference and visit our lovely community. "When Hot Springs hosted the regional meetings in 1996 and oaylilies in the Springs



2000, meetings were held at the Clarion Resort on Lake Hamilton. This year the meeting will be at the Austin Hotel & Convention Center, which is two blocks from the historic downtown area. Step back in time and visit the lobby of the Arlington Hotel (built in 1924) and tour the national park's visitor center, the Fordyce Bathhouse which has been restored to its original 1915 splendor. On Friday afternoon there will be bus shuttles to Garvan Woodland Gardens, a 210 acre botanical garden abutting Lake Hamilton. The Children's Adventure Garden opened last year and the beautiful wood and glass Chapel opened in 2006. More information about the downtown attractions and Garvan Woodland Gardens will be available in your welcome packet. Arrive early and stay late if you can - there are many things to see.

Artist Suzanne Lee Gentry

The front cover artwork was extracted from an original piece created by Suzanne Lee Gentry of Clearwater, Florida. She is the daughter of Ruth Siebels, a member of the Hot Springs Daylily Society. Suzanne was recognized for her art work as early as high school and progressively in the cities where she has lived, including: Corning, New York; Cincinnati, Ohio; Chicago, Illinois and now in Clearwater.

In addition to her artistic talent, she is an amateur hybridizer and actually claims two of the daylilies in her painting as her own seedlings. She is a member of the American Hemerocallis Society.

In her profession as a teacher, she was voted Teacher of the Year in 2008 and is noted each year for extraordinary contributions to her school's programs, including the Year Book project and generating art work for the Junior-Senior banquet.

Suzanne graduated from Kansas University in 1975 in the top 10 of a class of 700. She has two grown daughters, Lisa Swedo in Chicago and Jennifer Gentry in Seattle, Washington, and two granddaughters.

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Hot Springs and the Surrounding Area

The city's name came from the mineral-rich spring water bubbling forth from 47 natural hot springs at a rate of nearly a million gallons a day. The native Indians held the springs as sacred, and the Spanish explorer Hernando De Soto bathed in them in 1541. In December 1804, a year after the Louisiana Purchase, President Thomas Jefferson commissioned naturalist William Dunbar and chemist George Hunter to study and report on the wonderful hot springs that were part of the new addition to the nation. The area was designated the first federally protected area in the United States in 1832. Later when the National Park Service was created, Hot Springs became a national park. It has the distinction of being the smallest of the national parks consisting of 5,500 acres, but it is one of the most visited vacation destinations in the southern United States

Downtown Hot Springs is actually located in the park. The downtown historic district is one of the most beautifully restored landmarks in the country. The Victorian architecture, Bathhouse Row, the Arts District and the Antiques District, plus fine restaurants and entertainment await you. The Fordyce Bathhouse is now a museum with a rich history, stained glass and bathing areas. Two of the historic bathhouses are open for bathing: the Buckstaff and the Quapaw.

Hot Springs is located in the larger area known as the Diamond Lakes Region—Lakes Hamilton, Ouachita, Catherine and DeGray. So if you want to combine the conference with fishing, boating, sailing, hiking, bird watching or rock hunting, then opportunities abound. The diamond lakes tag stuck not only because of the four sparkling lakes, but also because the area is home to the only diamond mine in the United States. Located in Murfreesboro, the mine is open to the public.

There is even thoroughbred racing in the spring and games of skill every day at Oaklawn. While the live racing season is over in mid April, simulcast races are broadcast at Oakland on Central Avenue year round.

Because we are gardeners and lovers of green and growing things, we have planned a time for conferees to visit Garvan Woodland Gardens—Arkansas' Botanical Garden. The garden is on 210 acres abutting Lake Hamilton. It was bequeathed by Verna Garvan to the University of Arkansas School of Landscape Architecture for creation and maintenance into perpetuity of a woodland garden.

Expect to be WOWed by the seven beautiful gardens on tour Friday, June 11, and Saturday, June 12. Give in to the temptation to purchase daylilies at the Regional Auction, the Hot Springs Daylily Society's Boutique and from the Hot Water Raffle. And expect to be entertained and informed by feature speaker Lee Pickles. See you in Hot Springs.

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The Shearer Garden 754 Carpenter Dam Road Hot Springs, AR 71901

The Shearer home is located on three acres on Carpenter Dam Road in Hot Springs, AR. Kay and Charles purchased the property in 1997. They have been improving the bare open yard which consisted of rough turf and a few neglected fruit trees ever since. Their land posed many limitations to gardening due to the terrain. There was little top soil near the house. All the good soil had slid off the hill in the far part of the back yard. The gardens are located in the "Outback", which is constantly changing to meet their needs.

Kay has always liked to play in the dirt. She started collecting daylilies 12 years ago at the suggestion of a friend who commented "What a wonderful place to grow daylilies!" She started with a few plants purchased at the Hot Springs Daylily Society plant sale that spring. Those first 13 plants ended up with no names as she didn't realize that she should keep up with the names. She suffers from "CHAD", Compulsive Hemerocallis Acquisition Disorder, resulting in a hobby garden that has run amuck. The collection has grown to over 480 named cultivars, many acquired from State and Regional auctions.

Charles has never claimed to be a gardener, but all that changed when he was introduced to hybridizing at the first Region 13 meeting he attended in Shreveport, LA. He dabbled with hybridizing for several years. Kay jokingly tagged him as the "Flower Pimp". He retired in 2005 and found he no longer had time for "sex in the garden". Those early crosses have been culled and the best remain in the seedling bed. Gardens evolve, and so has Charles, who now proudly tells all that he is just the "Hole digger with an attitude".

Their collection consists of a wide variety of cultivars from many different hybridizers. Kay loves intense colors while Charles favors the doubles, spiders, and unusual forms. Some favorites are *Hemerocallis* 'King Kahuna' and *H*. 'Alex Sheets' by C. Crochet, *H*. 'Palace Garden Beauty' and *H*. 'Guadalajuara' by J. Carpenter, *H*. 'Victorian Lace' by P. Stamile, and *H*. 'Fear Not' by K. Emmerich.

Over the years both Kay and Charles have worked to improve the awareness of daylilies in their community as active members in Hot Springs Daylily Society, AR Daylily Society, and AHS. Kay has served as president and treasurer for HSDS, and on the AR Daylily Society board. Charles worked for several years handling the HSDS meeting mail outs. Both have served several years as co-chairs for the HSDS annual plant sale and are current AHS garden judges.

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In their life outside of daylilies, Kay and Charles love to travel the back roads of our great country by RV. They have been to 40 states, 3 Canadian provinces, taking in our country's great National Parks, geocaching and canoeing along the way. Their goal is to finish up the north American continent soon. They have also been to China, Egypt, Israel, Costa Rica, and northern Europe. At home they pursue varied hobbies. Charles is a certified sailor and loves to sail their 22 foot sailboat on Lake Ouachita. He also welds and tinkers in his well equipped work shop. Kay is the "gardener" but is also an accomplished seamstress, and novice wood carver. They never lack for things to do and can't figure out how they ever had time to work.

In addition to daylilies, Charles and Kay have planted over 10,000 daffodils throughout the lawn in large sweeps that herald in Spring each year. With so much full sun in their gardens, you may not notice the 40+ trees they have planted, a dozen of which are pecan trees. Charles has yet to beat the squirrels to the nuts each fall. They invite you to enjoy their private park by taking a leisurely stroll down the flagstone paths and enjoy the beauty of their daylilies.

The Scott Garden 247 Goosepond Road Lonsdale, Arkansas

This Garden of Eden is located in a rural setting about fifteen miles northeast of Hot Springs, Arkansas just off Highway 5. Highway 5 is a beautiful winding highway that flows with the contours of the rolling hills and streams located between Hot Springs and Benton, Arkansas.

Lowell and Pat Scott started this daylily passion with a small purchase from Mrs. Hodges from Helena, Arkansas in the early nineties. These beauties followed the Scotts to their present home in 2001. The garden is set in the midst of 25 acres of horse pasture. By horse pasture, one horse used to be seven, but the daylily bug has reduced the number to just "Patches", a gray and white Appaloosa, who will come and greet you if called.

With the help of son Richard and daughter Linda, an avid collector in her own right, the tiered beds began to take shape. The raised beds were a necessity due to the heavy, clay based, rocky acid soil. The garden now encompasses almost two acres and is steadily growing. Pat loves her daylilies and cannot seem to part with any of her "babies," so the need to add more and larger beds is necessary on a yearly basis.

The Scotts grow approximately 400 named cultivars most of which are labeled with cultivar name and hybridizer. Linda has been trying to get them to apply for AHS Display Garden Status but without success to date.

Pat does find time to hybridize. She works primarily with doubles and unusual forms but enjoys the occasional surprise from the bees or the flowers "kissing" each other in a gentle breeze. She loves the vibrant colors and hopes to introduce some flowers in the not so distant future.

In the front of the Garden you will be greeted first by Pepper, a seventy pound black lab, and then by the Western Bed of flowers with a country flavor in their names. You will find names like *Hemerocallis* **'Cherokee Beauty'**, *H*. **'Wild Mustang'**, *H*. **'Coyote Ugly'** Next to the Western Bed is an Arkansas Flagstone walkway. Some of the stones measure nearly 3" thick. On one side of the walkway are beautiful sasanquas of pink and white and other daylily beds filled with Pauline Henry and other hybridizers introductions.

Within the garden are dogwoods, two white and an unusual red that has yet to catch the others in size and shape. One of the white dogwoods was taken from Pat's original home place in Hot Springs. There are also miniature peach, fig, and a Japanese persimmon tree that produces enough fruit to break branches with the weight of the large orange to rose colored fruit. They still grow a few irises and dahlias but the daylilies are slowly crowding them out. There are plenty of companion plants such as coleus, salvia, zinnias for summer color and enough shade for the hostas and to give one a break from the summer heat.

The Scotts use the daylilies as a respite from office work during the summer months and are avid hunters during the winter months. The Scotts are members of the Hot Springs Daylily Society, the Arkansas State Club and the AHS.

The Winberry Garden

179 Goosepond Road Lonsdale, Arkansas

Linda Winberry, an administrative assistant for an accounts receivable firm in Hot Springs, started her venture into daylilies in 2000. After failing miserably with roses she looked for something that she could not kill. She was introduced to daylilies by her mother, Patsy Scott, and uncle, Charlie Morehart. After joining the Hot Springs Daylily Society she was introduced to J.D. and Darlene Hill; they became her steadfast friends and her mentors in daylilies. Her collection swelled to over 300 registered daylilies in less than two years.

At the urging of J.D. Hill, Linda tried her first crossings in 2001. The hybridizing bug hit Linda soon after and the seedling beds have since crowded out many of the named cultivars. She works exclusively with tetraploids and has made great strides in the area of blue and washed eyes. A number of her seedlings are sporting nice edges bordered with shark's teeth. Blues are not her only pursuit. Linda also works with selfs, eyes, large flowers and miniatures. Her hybridizing efforts have started gaining her attention with local and not-so-local clubs who are now requesting speaking engagements. Her immediate plans include a possible green house located on an existing 20' X 75' concrete slab and additional seedling beds on top of the "hill". She does have one co-introduction thanks to a seedling purchased from Jack Carpenter. *Hemerocallis*, **'Jachameleon'** (Carpenter-Winberry, 2008) is a 6.25" lavender pink beauty with a washed violet watermark that tends to change with the heat of the day.

The garden is about three-quarters of an acre and is situated on a five-acre tract adjacent to her parents' acreage and garden. The garden's size is limited by her full time job which forces her to select only the very best seedlings. She figures the more ground she uses the more marginal seedlings she will retain. Linda is very hard on her seedlings making sure only the very strongest survive to even have the chance for selection. Linda says, "Daylilies are supposed to be tough". Planted amid her backyard haven one can find

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clematis, banana trees, Japanese maples, apple, and fig trees. Believe it or not one can even find a rose bush or two, along with various other companion plants.

Linda is a member of AHS and attended her first national convention, Houston, Texas, 2008. She serves on the Arkansas State Daylily Society Board of Directors. She has served as vice president of the Hot Springs Daylily Society, publishes the club's membership book and is chair for this year's Regional Auction. She is always willing to donate plants, as well as clean, tag and sell at the club's yearly public plant sales. Interesting things are yet to come from this fledgling hybridizer.

The Worley Garden Dr. J. Floyd Worley 12937 Meadow Ridge Benton, Arkansas

The Worley garden is located in a countryside subdivision approximately five miles west of Benton, Arkansas. Situated on three acres, this informal garden is bordered by a spring-fed creek surrounded by moss-covered stone, native ferns, dogwoods and redbuds, which put on a spectacular show in early spring.

Dr. Worley (Floyd), a retired educator of 43 years, was an elementary teacher, principal, administrator and superintendent. Floyd and his wife, Linda, moved back to Arkansas after retiring in Texas. He then took the superintendent position at Fountain Lake School District in Hot Springs and joined the Hot Springs Daylily Club.

Always an avid gardener, his interest in daylilies started about eighteen years ago when he discovered some daylily seedlings growing on the windowsill of a colleague. He immediately went out and purchased ten cultivars from the colleague's mother and began hybridizing with the very first blooms.

Floyd's garden is a work in progress and you would not image that it is only four years old. His three acres were filled with trees, honeysuckle vines, wild strawberry vines

and sticker bushes before the house was built. The garden greets you with several raised beds bordered with natural stone, all hand laid by Floyd. The real show is located at the rear of the property where the garden gently slopes as it is part of the foothills of the Ouachita Mountains. In this beautifully laid out rear garden, you will find raised beds terraced with Ozark natural stone. Floyd's collection consists of over 375 cultivars, both the oldies but goodies, as well as the latest and greatest. Floyd grows approximately 500 seedlings each year. As of this writing,



he has yet to introduce but had a seedling in 2009 that bloomed continuously from mid May through September.

The garden does not just boast daylilies; Floyd also grows grasses, shrubs, perennials, and annuals. The front garden is adjacent to his daughter's property and provides enough shade to grow hostas, ferns and fifteen different varieties of hydrangeas.

He presently serves as a board member of the Arkansas Daylily Society and is past president and vice president of the Hot Springs Daylily Society. In Floyd's spare time he enjoys spoiling grandchildren, gardening, church activities and construction. Floyd built the barn, greenhouse and all of the tiered and raised beds that are located on the property. Floyd looks forward to welcoming all Region 13 Meeting attendees.

White Rock Gardens Phyllis and Odie Kirtley 265 Woodridge Lane Benton, AR 72019

White Rock Gardens moved from Dumas, Arkansas a nice flat property with full sun, to Benton in 2004. The garden name came from the white quartz that can be seen protruding from the ground and must be pick axed in order to build flower beds. The bed edges are created from the quartz that is excavated when building the raised beds.

The garden is located about four miles off scenic Highway 5 on a 3.5 acre plot of land complete with rolling hills and plenty of trees. Only about three



quarters of the property has been developed into the garden you see today. With trees you get leaves, acorns and of course volunteer saplings in the daylily and iris beds. But the shade that is provided is well worth the inconvenience.

There were a number of beds already on the property and the daylilies moved before the furniture. In addition to over 250 daylilies, there are a number of companion plants including bearded iris, beardless iris, hellebore, crape myrtles, ferns, hosta and peonies. The collection of iris exceeds that of the daylilies, numbering over 300.



Odie, resident bed builder, is a retired farmer, loves to tell visitors just how many "last beds" have been added to the garden over the years. The Kirtleys love of daylilies started nearly twenty years ago. Phyllis did try her hand at hybridizing when she first started collecting but left most of the seedlings at their former home. She is content just collecting and enjoying the blooms. Her favorite daylily is the oldie but goodie *Hemerocallis* **'Orange Velvet'** but newer varieties, like *H.* **'Face Paint'** have caught her fancy over the past few years

Phyllis is a member of the American Hemerocallis Society, the Hot Springs Daylily Society, the Arkansas State Society, the Central Arkansas Iris Society, the Hot Springs Iris Society and the American Iris Society. If

that were not enough she also collects Louisiana iris and is a member of the Society of Louisiana Iris. Phyllis has applied for and is awaiting approval to have the garden become an official AHS Display Garden.

The Kirtley's are excited at the prospect of Region 13 visitors visiting their garden and welcome all.

The Yadron Garden Joe and Donna Yadron 29 Sorpresa Way Hot Springs, Arkansas

The garden of Joe and Donna Yadron is located in Hot Springs Village, a gated community about twenty miles northeast of Hot Springs, Arkansas. It is located on the west side of Lake Balboa in this hilly and heavily wooded community. You could not dream a more perfect garden setting. Joe,



a retired metallurgical engineer whose career in the aluminum industry required moves to various parts of the country, and Donna enjoy the fruits of their gardening efforts and their other interests.

Members of the Garland County master gardeners, this couple has created a garden of many plant types. Just a sampling of things you will find growing in this garden are iris, hosta, azalea, calla lily, cone flowers and many other perennials. Recent additions are brugmansia or Angel's Trumpets in several colors. The huge blooms have a dramatic effect, especially in the fall. The Yadrons attempt to have at least one blooming plant in their garden every month of the year. This is more or less successful, depending on the appetites of the local wildlife.



There are a number of garden focal points including small areas of boulders, garden paths, three patios that offer different vantage points, and a bronze mermaid who tries to entice boaters as she spills water into the lake. A variety of yard art adds character and accents to the flavor of the garden.

The garden was started in 1996 and the daylilies were added, in 1997. The first daylilies were received from

their daughter's garden. Some of the varieties grown are very old and were handed down from her mother-in-law. One of their first was *Hemerocallis* **'Kwanza'** which quickly became an unwelcome guest invading adjacent beds and grass areas. The favorite in 2009 was *H.* **'Key to Treasures'**. It seems like it just didn't want to stop blooming. The daylilies, numbering about seventy, are used to add color and texture to the already abundant landscape.

The Yadrons are members of the Hot Springs Daylily Society as well as the Garland County Master Gardeners. Joe served as president in 2008. Also members of the Hot Springs Iris Society and the Ouachita Shade Plant Society, they stay quite busy. Donna is also a member of the Village Pines Garden Club and Joe is a member of the Men's Village Garden Club. They have chaired the master gardener's booth at the Garvan Woodlands Garden Plant Sale for the past six years.

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In their spare time the Yadrons enjoy golfing, boating, traveling, dancing to Cajun music (they love Fred's), and, of course, spoiling grandchildren.

You are sure to enjoy this beautiful garden and Joe and Donna welcome all to visit the garden during the 2010 Region 13 Meeting.

Tom and Karen's garden is also referred to as their playpen. They moved to Hot Springs Village, Arkansas in 1993 after they retired from the U.S. Army. The Village is nestled in Hot Springs National Park amid forests of evergreen and deciduous trees, 30 minutes from Hot Springs and about an hour southwest of Little Rock.

Tom and Karen bought two lots sideby-side so that they would have room for their flowers and garden. There is a division of labor in that Tom grows 66 hybrid tea roses, 6 climbing roses, Zoysia lawn, and anything that is edible. Karen grows flowers with interspersed weeds. The second lot is a sea of grass with 15 irregularly shaped flower beds. Each of the beds is monochromatic and there is usually a gazing ball corresponding to the color of that particular island.



Amongst these 15 beds are 200+ varieties of daylilies, 100 Asiatic, Trumpet and Oriental lilies, 15 specimens of shrubs, 16 varieties of trees, 35 perennial flowers, extensive vegetable and herb garden, mixed varieties of annuals for summer color, visiting critters ranging from raccoons, armadillos, foxes, coyotes, deer, and wild turkey. Across the length and width of the yard are an additional 10 iris beds with over 300 bearded irises.

Unlike many daylily gardens, the daylilies alternate between chrysanthemums and lilies around the borders of each of the 15 flower beds.

Karen became interested in daylilies around 2002 and has been an active member of the Hot Springs Daylily Society for about the last 5 years. Much like her irises, Karen grows daylilies for their beauty and color, but does not hybridize.

Karen is a member of the Hot Springs Daylily Society and the Arkansas Daylily Society. She is also a member of the Hot Springs Iris Society and the American Iris Society. She



has given presentations on irises and "Year Round Color" in your garden to local garden clubs and at Garvan Woodland Gardens.

Both Tom and Karen can usually be found working in the yard. They are also involved with military and community activities.

Lee Pickles is the most recent recipient of the Helen Field Fisher Gold Medal. Established in 1950, the Helen Field Fischer Gold Medal is the society's highest honor and is the official recognition for distinguished and meritorious service rendered the AHS by a member on the national level. It is named for the founder of the American Hemerocallis Society.

Lee Pickles, of Hixson, Tennessee, is Past President of the Tennessee Valley Daylily Society and travels extensively giving presentations to daylily clubs and symposia. Lee joined the AHS in 1986 and immediately put his skills to use for the benefit of the AHS. Lee was elected Regional Vice President for his region in 1990-1992. He served as the Editor of his region's newsletter in 1990-2002 and distinguished himself as one of the first to introduce color and desktop publishing software to daylily newsletters. In recognition of his groundbreaking newsletters, "The Daylily Appeal" won the AHS Best Newsletter Award in 2000. Lee broke new ground by introducing the concept of off-season symposia and chairing the very first Mid-Winter Symposium (MWS) in Chattanooga, Tennessee. Off-season symposia further the educational goals of the society and foster social networking within the society at a national level. Lee is also a distinguished daylily hybridizer. He registered his first daylily, *Hemerocallis*, **'Choo Choo Fantasy'**, in 1995 and has registered over 100 cultivars. AHS is pleased to recognize and honor Lee Pickles for his creative contributions and dedicated service to the AHS and its members.

In 1993 Lee and his lovely wife Jean purchased two acres in Hixson, Tennessee just about twenty minutes north of Chattanooga. One of the first things they did at the new property was erect a greenhouse to further their hybridizing and seedling growing efforts. Hybridizing is now done in the greenhouse during March and April. This allows for earlier seed set and harvesting which in turn allows for earlier planting and increases the chance of 90 - 95% bloom by the second season. The seedlings, 3000-5000 per season, are evaluated outside so as to get a "true" measure of their performance. The Pickles do not pump up their plants by artificial means in order to introduce only those flowers which will perform as well or better in your garden than they do in their own.

Lee and Jean are both educators. Jean taught fourth grade most of her career, retiring in 1999. Lee started out as a classroom teacher and moved on to administration, ending his career as an administrator in the Dean's Office at the University of Tennessee College of Medicine. He retired in 1998.

Jean is a Master Gardener and is quite active in their projects. In her spare time Jean is a rug hooker. In the off season the Pickles love to travel with the Napa Valley being one of their favorite vacation spots.
