## Terrio Daylily Garden...

As we arrived at Jimmy and Linda Terrio's home, the wreaths on the double front doors of the house made us feel welcome. We immediately saw many daylilies. On each side of the front walk were sculptures of angels surrounded by daylilies. Then to the left of the home a large bed extending along the side of the house was full to the brim with daylily seedlings, the work of Jimmy, a hybridizer whose work will soon earn him accolades in the daylily world.

Attention to the right side of the garden is drawn to a large sugar kettle filled with yellow lantanas. We proceeded to a more formal entrance to the side and back gardens where a wrought iron fence was centered with a large circular sign on which was

painted a large yellow daylily with the words "Terrio Daylily Garden" circling it. Along the rim of the sign were black-spotted, bright red ladybugs.

Our eyes soon shifted to the clump of *Hemerocallis* 'Seducator', a Lee Gates introduction and one of his most famous reds. Another eye-catching clump was the dark red cultivar of Ted Petit, *H.* 'Bourbon Street'.

Daylilies continued the length of the property: each clump was tagged with easily read markers, each was in peak growing condition, weedless and well mulched. One bed, planted along a low picket cypress fence displayed mainly pastel daylilies, with one, by Dan Trimmer, *H.* 'Sweeter than Sugar', a rose pink with a darker rose eye, calling attention to itself in the heavily mulched bed. In another bed, we enjoyed seeing Clarence Crochet's *H.* 'Richfield Earlene Garber', a huge pastel cream pink blend with an exquisite green throat.

The centerpiece of the rear garden was a U-shaped aviary with a comfortable green swing in the open space of the U. To the right of the aviary was a large round bed of daylilies featuring a large, tiered fountain in its center.

Although the garden featured masses of daylilies, many other plants were displayed at their best: begonias, roses, zinnias, petunias, amaryllis, ferns, split leaf philodendrons and sasanquas were all artistically placed to enhance the overall presentation.

The sizeable covered patio contained tantalizing treats for the guests and ample seating for relaxed viewing of the beautiful garden. Featured also was a picture of a quilt created by several of the talented Baton Rouge Daylily Society members.

Jimmy's collection boasts many of the latest introductions from the top hybridizers. Cultivars that called special attention to themselves were: *H.* 'Gary Colby' (Petit), *H.* 'Boundless Beauty' (Stamile), and *H.* 'Winston Churchill' (Trimmer), but each plant in this impressive garden deserved its own homage. This means that to truly grasp the accomplishments of the Terrios will require repeat visits. We look forward to doing so.

If this is what Tim and Carolyn can do in just a few months time, my mind flashes forward to 2011 and the National Convention, and my mouth begins to water thinking of the beauty that we will see when we return!

I began to walk Tim’s seedlings and, of course, was first greeted by his new registration, *Hemerocallis* ‘**Hippie Crash Pad**’ which has developed a near “cult” following. For those that love *H.* ‘**Hippie Crash Pad**’, be forewarned you will be sending more and more of your daylily funds the Tassins’ way. There were huge dinner-plate size flowers with ruffles, and teeth, dark eyes, and no eyes, UFs and spiders, many with uniquely colored selves, eyes and edges.

Appropriately, this garden was also the home for this year’s Region 13 Emma Middlebrooks seedling bed. There were thirty four seedlings entered by Region 13 hybridizers, and to our pleasure the majority were open to be viewed and truly assessed. The competition was fierce, lending another view to the future of more great daylily introductions from Region 13 hybridizers. And, it came as no surprise to me that the winning seedling was none other than one of Tim’s. It looked beautiful and was so brilliantly colored, heavily subtanced and luscious looking as to make many comment that it was not only good enough to look at and buy, but it looked good enough to eat like a piece of refreshing fruit!

**T**our garden hosts, Jean and Chuck Ingram, greeted Regional 13 meeting visitors with a smile on their faces and wearing matching embroidered “Ingram Garden” daylily shirts! The Ingram’s Garden has been an American Hemerocallis Display Garden for six years. They are members of the Mississippi Gulf Coast Society, as well as the Baton Rouge Daylily Society.

A carved wooden medallion adorning a tree greets garden patrons. The front spacious, curved bed was showcased with brilliant multi-colored impatiens and flanked with liriopse. Gardeners were pleasantly surprised to find the Ingram’s Pelican Garden, accented with a stone pelican surrounded by an array of colorful daylilies. The Ingrams grow about 250

varieties of daylilies, with their very favorite daylily being *Hemerocallis* ‘**Jolie Monde**’, introduced by Clarence Crochet. They especially love this flower because of its large, beautiful form.

The Ingrams won “The Tot Ratliff Award” for the best clump seen in a Region 13 tour garden. *H.* ‘**Hotcakes**’, Mathew Kaskel, was showing off with twenty-five, perfectly spaced, bright yellow blooms. If that were not enough, the Ingrams were also the recipients of the “Lee Gates Memorial Award” for the best red cultivar seen on the Region 13 tour. The winning cultivar was *H.* ‘**Seduced**’, Dan Hansen, which was outstanding. All the plants were well grown in large clumps that appeared to have been undisturbed for many years.

Jean’s passion for creating beautiful quilts was illustrated in her garden room. She has begun quilting a unique eighteen-square pattern that boasts a different daylily in each square. This quilt is bordered with a patterned green fabric and will be auctioned at the 2011 National Convention to be held in Baton Rouge. Some avid daylily enthusiast will win a unique prize!

## Tour Day in May – The Crochet Daylily Garden

On the recent tour day of the Regional Meeting in May, the beds were pristine and the clumps full and lush. More than a thousand blooms were open and made an exquisite site. Many of you may have visited the wonderful garden that is Crochet Daylily Garden in Prairieville, Louisiana. If you have not yet had this pleasure, be sure to put it “on your list!”

For as long as I have known them, this family has always pulled together – especially for tour day. Clarence and his daughter Barbara had the garden in its’ usual “top tour form” for visitors. They are garden partners these days and work daily in the garden. On this tour day, Barbara and crew had the garden ready early on tour morning. She and her husband Terrell, live next door with their sons Jonathan and Alex Sheets; who help ensure the lawn is manicured and ready. Clarence’s oldest son Mark, his wife Trisha and son Jason Mark arrived, with Mark’s special punch recipe and punch bowl. Trisha readied the snacks and cashews that are always a favorite. Barbara had a frosty supply of ice cream cones stowed in her freezer. So one hour before the bus arrives, this family was ready for guests. The quiet calm before the tour reminded me of their beloved wife and mother Beth, and her quiet grace and hospitality. I think she would be pleased her family has continued the tradition of welcoming all of us to their lovely garden.

Then a cell phone rang with the call from the bus saying the visitors are but a few minutes away. True to schedule, the visitors step off the bus and walk up the drive. At first glance, they may notice the immaculate, modest home of black brick and white trim as classic as one of Clarence’s pencil sketches. The pink Impatiens were striking at the base of the carport’s planter that was filled with huge leaves from caladium ‘White Christmas’ corms that Clarence saves and re-plants each year in Mid-March. But the daylilies are the stars and would not be upstaged!

The main show bed labeled Number 7 in front of the house is The Crochet Daylily bed. Here are grown Clarence’s recent introductions and his 2008 introduction *Hemerocallis* ‘**Rose Windmill**’\*. It is a lovely spider with blooms that dance about 8 inches above the medium height foliage on nice strong 30” scapes. The striking yellow throat complements the petal color of rose; a new color in his Windmill series of spiders. Other prominent Crochet introductions in Number 7 are fine examples of *H.* ‘**Alex Sheets**’\*, with its shimmering coppery rose bloom; *H.* ‘**Barbara Sheets**’, a lovely ivory pink with peach band; *H.* ‘**Richfield Earlene Garber**’, the consummate full, 8 inch round cream pink; and *H.* ‘**King Kahuna**’ the renowned award winning double of pure butter yellow.

Also in the front beds, you find *H.* ‘**Go L.S.U.!**’\* It is purple and gold with gold ruffled edged blossom is in honor of the University attended by many in the family. *H.* ‘**Richfield Wonder**’ is a very nice dormant introduction of ivory pink with a ruby eye that does well in the coastal South. A personal favorite of mine is *H.* ‘**Jolie Monde**’ in the tradition of the big pink plate daylilies that shines in pale pink with a cool lemon eye and

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course, I was delighted to overhear a visitor say *H. 'Richfield Muriel's Double'* is a good, colorful and reliable daylily in her garden.

Clarence's new "big pink good seedling" is growing in Number 7. It was lovely on Tour day in May and still beautiful and blooming strong on July 11<sup>th</sup>. He says this 4 star pink is in line to be a 2009 introduction. And if you ever wondered, "good" on one of his seedling tags is very high praise indeed and the tag usually displays 4 stars!

Several fine seedlings being considered were blooming in the highlighted Seedling Bed just outside the living room window. One very nice rose seedling had stunning deep red veining and ruffles, nice form and color contrast drew much attention from visitors. The "big pink plate" style shows in several of his other fine seedlings. There are new spiders that attest to the strength of the Crochet hybridizing program.

In other round show beds in front of the house are new registrations by various top hybridizers. The newest cultivars are planted on the outer border of each bed to make hybridizing easier. Some of Clarence's favorites are *Hemerocallis 'Big Yellow Taxi'*\* by Dan Trimmer, a fine 6.75 inch full form pale yellow with evergreen foliage; *H. 'Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis'*\* by Frank Smith with its' 6 inch lovely pink petals and heavy gold ruffled edge worthy of its' namesake; and *H. 'Mississippi Man'*\* by Dan Trimmer is a 6.5 inch dark pink with white edges and a pale yellow eye. One blooming on tour day that I liked was *H. 'Lies and Lipstick'*\* by John Kinnebrew, a 5.5 inch pink with a red eye and red gold edge that re-blooms to give a nice long season. The flamboyant *H. 'Bridey Greeson'*\* by Grace-Smith has a bloom that always catches my eye with its many colors from rose mauve to blue-violet and a shimmering petal surface. A visitor asked how he achieves such fine growth and a full garden look on tour day even while he digs and sells all spring. A tip from Clarence: As the unit for sale in this retail garden is a double fan per cultivar, each fall the beds are reworked, soil amended and double fan units are lined out. The plants are well watered, sprayed and fed; growing into the customary Crochet 'big fans' by spring sales time. This unit planting makes it easy to dig an order of a double fan and not divide or disturb other units.

You can see that a visit to this garden can be a real treat. Our thanks to Clarence and his family for asking us all to visit and also for being such fine stewards of this family garden and tradition for more than four decades. **Merci!**

## Nicholas Walker Wins Sweepstakes Award



Nicholas Walker, an up-and-coming daylily hybridizer from the Ruston area, claimed top awards at the recent Ark-La-Tex Daylily Flower Show held on June 7, 2008, at the Barnwell Center in Shreveport, Louisiana. Nick won the extra-large flower award for *Hemerocallis* ‘**Windmill Yellow,**’ and the Sweepstakes Award for the most blue ribbons. In addition, “The Award of Appreciation” was given to Nick for displaying

his Louisiana Agriculture & Forestry Junior Division State Science Fair winning project, “How Do You Get Those Designer Genes?”

Nick is an honor student attending Quitman High School. The United States Achievement Academy announced he was named an “All-American Scholar At-Large” award winner and appeared in the All-American Scholar Official Yearbook. The Academy recognizes fewer than 10 percent of all American high school students and All-American Scholar winners based on the Standards of Selections set forth by the Academy. The criteria for selection are a student’s grade point average, student achievements, and a well-balanced schedule of academics and extra-curricular activities.

Nick was the eighth grade Student of the Year from Quitman High School in 2008. In 2007, Nick won the seventh grade plant science division with his project, “To Help a Daylily Seed Sprout”. Nick won the “Best in Agriculture & Forestry Science Fair Achievement Award”, 2007 Region II Science Fair. Bob Odom, then Commissioner of Agriculture & Forestry, presented the award to Nick.

Nick is a sought after speaker for garden clubs, maintains his own daylily garden and seedling bed, and anticipates introducing a spider daylily this fall. Nick is a member of the American Hemerocallis Society and The Ark-La-Tex Daylily Study Club. He is the son of Christy and Leo Walker of Vernon, Louisiana.

Robert Race of Siloam Springs received the award for Best Seedling, and had another seedling receive a Purple Award, which was the first time ever two Purples had been awarded in Seedling Section. The club had its most ever number of entries at 180. The NWADS is planning to return to the Botanical Garden of the Ozarks for its 2009 Exhibition, as the Exhibition had over 100 gardeners from around the area view the entries at this location.

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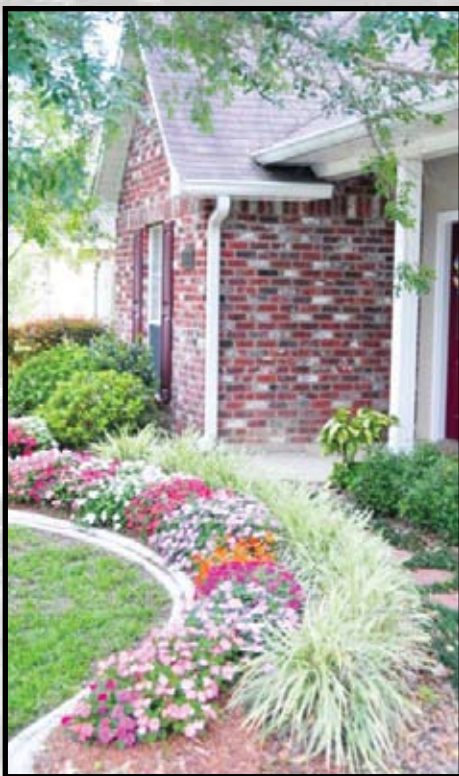


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# Minutes Region 13 Summer Meeting
